

Connecting Iowa With the World and the World With Iowa

The University of Iowa is committed to enriching the global experience of students, faculty, staff, and the greater community. International Programs does this by providing leadership and support for internationally oriented teaching, research, creative work, and community engagement.



COLLEGE OF NURSING

In 2023, Associate Professor **Juliana Souza Talarico** and her team launched the first
International Indigenous Dementia Research
Network (IIDRN) Annual Conference,
enhancing international impact. As a steering
committee member since 2018, she has
developed culturally sensitive tools for
dementia care among Brazilian indigenous
populations and collaborated globally. IIDRN
aims to build research capacity and foster a
supportive network for advancing Alzheimer's
disease and dementia research in Indigenous
communities.



COLLEGE OF LIBERAL ARTS AND SCIENCES

Adam Brummett, an associate professor of chemistry, and Anny-Dominique Curtius, a professor of French and Italian, received the 2024 International Engagement Teaching Award for fostering international learning experiences. Brummett developed a study abroad course in sustainable chemistry and always emphasizes experiential learning and inclusivity. Curtius creates an intellectually stimulating environment, constantly bridging languages and cultures, and encourages students to go beyond the classroom to become creative thinkers and global citizens.



COLLEGE OF LAW

Brian Farrell, associate professor of instruction, received a Special Projects Award from International Programs to fund the Iowa Human Rights Research Conference, held on April 20, 2024, at the UI College of Law. The event featured 26 student presentations from across Iowa and a keynote by genocide scholar Mark Celinscak. With 127 attendees, the conference highlighted significant human rights research.



GRADUATE COLLEGE

Emily Wieder, a third-year doctoral candidate in French and francophone world studies and a 2024 Stanley Award for International Research recipient, traveled to Paris to examine correspondence between women surrealist artists, investigating their political resistance against Nazism during World War II. Wieder's research aims to uncover how these women used surrealism's emphasis on freedom of expression to resist fascism. She will also present her findings at the International Society for the Study of Surrealism's annual conference.



TIPPIE COLLEGE OF BUSINESS

The Tippie College of Business hosted African university leaders from Kenya, Uganda, and Ghana in April 2024, as part of the Institute for International Business' Executive Training Program series. In collaboration with partners around the University of Iowa campus, the Institute for International Business at Tippie hosts specialized executive leadership and governance training programs for professionals from across the globe.



COLLEGE OF PHARMACY

PharmD students **Deeya Karkera** and **Kristi Lee** completed an Advanced Pharmacy
Practice Experiences (APPE) rotation at
Kitasato University School of Pharmacy in
Japan. The experience was a mixture of
visits and practice observation in patient care
clinics, hospitals and community pharmacies,
along with classroom sessions on better
understanding the Japanese health care
system and pharmacy education in Japan.



COLLEGE OF PUBLIC HEALTH

Dr. Jim Yong Kim received the College of Public Health's 2024 Richard and Barbara Hansen Leadership Award. A former president of the World Bank Group, former director of the World Health Organization's HIV/AIDS department, and co-founder of Partners in Health, Kim met with University of Iowa leaders, students, faculty, and staff and delivered a keynote lecture, "Reflections on 40 Years in Global Health: Faith in Things Unseen."



COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

In partnership with the University of Iowa's USAID-funded Private Sector Partnerships to Strengthen Higher Education Activity, four UI students traveled to Kosovo for a study tour after completing the two-credit course "Kosovo Newborn: Exploring Europe's Youngest Country." During their visit, students presented projects developed throughout the course in line with the activity's objectives, covering topics such as establishing and maintaining student clubs and utilizing social media for community asset mapping.



COLLEGE OF DENTISTRY

Tabitha Peter, a PhD candidate in biostatistics and a graduate research assistant for the lowa Institute for Oral Health Research, was awarded a Fulbright Study/Research Grant to Colombia for 2024-25. She plans to use her time in Colombia to integrate community engagement elements from patients recruited from the Noel Clinic, a non-profit pediatric clinic in Medellín, with her dissertation project investigating genetic markers related to cleft lip and palate.



COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING

chengzhe Li, a PhD candidate in chemical and biochemical engineering, is developing a new predictive atmospheric model which will allow scientists to forecast and issue warnings for air pollution events in developing countries. The model simulates particulates in the atmosphere to pinpoint both the timing and location of occurrences of air pollution. The method was tested in Ethiopia and combines surface air pollution data collected from instruments at two U.S. Department of State facilities.



CARVER COLLEGE OF MEDICINE

Final-year medical student **Julia Fleecs** worked with Eye Corps, a non-profit organization with the goal to eliminate preventable blindness in Tanzania through a model of sustainable eye care, with particular interest in reducing gender inequity in vision care. Based on this work, as well as initiatives concerning the ophthalmological needs of survivors of acid burns and on pelvic floor disorders in Ugandan women, Fleecs will graduate with distinction in global health in May 2025.



COMMITMENT TO INTERNATIONALIZATION LECTURE SERIES

Debra Cagan (BGS '75, MA '77), senior advisor at the Atlantic Council's Eurasia Center and distinguished fellow at the Transatlantic Leadership Network, was the 11th speaker in the Commitment to Internationalization Lecture Series with a talk titled, "Perspectives on Contemporary Geopolitics" in October.



In 2024, the University of lowa's Study Abroad office saw an increase in faculty-led programs in less-common destinations, reflecting a growing interest in unique international experiences. One highlight was the return of the Child Life in South Africa program, which examines psychosocial and developmental issues impacted by childhood illness and hospitalizations. This program, exploring South Africa's culture and healthcare systems, was a huge success with strong enrollment and enthusiasm. Additionally, the Ghana Education and Culture program ran for the second time, offering students an immersive study of Ghana's education system, culture, and social dynamics. Both programs showcase the university's commitment to broadening global engagement and providing transformative learning experiences in less-common locations.

Faculty interest in leading study abroad programs remains strong, with new opportunities emerging each year. The Exploring Major Health Determinants in Spain program, launched in summer 2024, allowed students to explore health determinants in Madrid and Valencia, comparing systems in Spain and the U.S. Faculty-led programs like this enrich students' global perspectives and reflect faculty enthusiasm for impactful international experiences.

International internship enrollments remained strong in 2024, providing students with valuable professional experience abroad. These internships help students hone career skills, immerse themselves in new cultures, and develop transferable skills. Through partnerships with organizations like IES Abroad, SIT, and CEA, the University of Iowa ensures students receive tailored placements that align with their academic and career goals while maintaining high standards for health and safety oversight.

DR. KEN MAGID SCHOLARSHIP

The Dr. Ken Magid Scholarship, a fund that was established in 2022 by the late Linda Baker (BA English '68) in memory of her former mentor, author and child behaviorist Dr. Kenneth Magid, is designed for UI undergraduate students who intend to pursue an academic internship while embracing the cultural nuances and complexities of life abroad.

STUDY ABROAD CONVERSATION SERIES

This year, we inaugurated a new series aimed at prospective study abroad students. The Study Abroad Conversation Series creates an opportunity for students who have studied abroad to share their experiences with other UI students. Whether students are considering going abroad or are already planning their trip, these sessions cover essential topics, all told from the perspective of students who have been there. The first events held this fall covered how to pay for study abroad, in partnership with the Office of Student Financial Aid, and internships, careers, and resume preparation, in coordination with the Pomerantz Career Center.

Study Abroad Peer Mentor Program

The Study Abroad Peer Mentors are a group of undergraduate student volunteers who have studied abroad during their time at the University of Iowa. All peer mentors have unique skills and experiences that prospective study abroad students can draw upon as they are preparing for their international experience. Currently, there are over 20 peer mentors giving their time to help other Hawkeyes.



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

The total number of international students on campus saw a slight decline this year as we continue to see our population shift to more graduate and professional students, as was the case prior to the 2010s. Now that the pendulum is swinging back towards a higher percentage of postsecondary students, we see a greater need for programming related to professional development and mentoring. We're glad to see the slow, steady, and diverse growth of our graduate and professional students. These consistently solid numbers are due primarily to the deep and extensive research and teaching infrastructure at lowa which in turn provides support in the form of research and teaching assistantships. We're happy to say we are meeting their unique needs by adding more programming focusing on peer mentorship, finding internships during their programs, and even helping them determine what immigration status they might seek out once their F-1 program with the University of lowa ends. International Programs also continues to work with the Office of Admissions on recruitment efforts in emerging parts of the world to bring students here whose presence and contributions will enrich our community on both an intellectual and cultural level thereby enhancing the UI's reputation across the globe.

Student Profile



MENG ZHOU

Meng Zhou (PhD informatics '23), from China, embarked on a new role as an assistant scientist at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). In 2021, he received the competitive NASA FINESST Fellowship Award for his research on using satellite remote sensing to monitor environmental conditions, particularly pollutants and nighttime wildfires. The unique aspect of Zhou's work is that he utilizes sensors that operate at night, leveraging moonlight scattered by polluted air to monitor air quality. For wildfires, he developed an innovative algorithm to assess their intensity and combustion phases, providing critical data on how many pollutants will be emitted to the air by the wildfire. "The NASA FINESST Fellowship Award is notable not only for its honor but also because it is the sole fellowship available to international students offered by NASA," said Zhou. "It is highly competitive, attracting candidates from across the graduate student and early-career post-doctorate spectrum nationwide, with a selection rate of 10-15%. This demonstrates that graduate students from the University of Iowa are just as capable as those from institutions like Harvard and Yale."



BUILDING OUR GLOBAL COMMUNITY TURNS 20

A collaboration between International Programs at the University of Iowa and the UI Human Resources Learning & Development team, Building Our Global Community (BGC) is a certificate program for faculty and staff to better interact with and support international students and scholars. Since its inception two decades ago, BGC has enhanced intercultural awareness and fostered a more globally minded and welcoming campus by providing valuable training to over 1,000 UI faculty and staff.

INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION WEEK

A joint initiative of the U.S. Department of State and the U.S. Department of Education, International Education Week (IEW) celebrates the many ways international education and exchange opportunities prepare citizens for community building in both national and international settings. This year, the University of Iowa kicked off IEW with a Multicultural Showcase—an event intended to introduce UI students, faculty, staff, and community members to different cultures through vocal and dance performances, ethnic dishes, and interactive tabling hosted by student organizations and UI colleges and departments.

YOUTH VOICES UNITE IN MULTILINGUAL TRIBUTE TO ANNE FRANK'S LEGACY

The Anne Frank Initiative (AFI), an International Programs affinity group organized a moving event at the Iowa City Public Library on October 20, 2024, where 15 young readers brought Anne Frank's diary to life in their native languages. Distinguished Holocaust scholar and National Book Award winner Dr. Theodore Rosengarten delivered a compelling address, emphasizing the enduring relevance of Frank's words. The event, part of the 2024 Iowa City Book Festival, drew an emotional response from the audience and marked the unveiling of the first Anne Frank Initiative Little Library. 2024 INTERNATIONAL IMPACT AWARD RECIPIENTS



David A. Hamod (BA political science '81), an advocate for U.S. businesses overseas and champion of American citizens abroad, and Richard J. Tyner (BA French, political science '70), an international business lawyer by trade and staunch proponent of international education, were the winners of the 2024 International Impact Award.

Hamod is president and CEO of the National U.S.-Arab Chamber of Commerce (NUSACC), the number one commercial bridge between the U.S. and the Middle East and North Africa. In addition to receiving his BA from the University of Iowa, Hamod received an MA from the Johns Hopkins University School of International Studies. Hamod's professional career has revolved around such global entities as the Brookings Institution, IBM, New York Times, OECD (Paris), and the World Bank. Hamod has also testified before the U.S. Senate and U.S. House of Representatives on numerous occasions.

Tyner grew up on a farm south of Shenandoah in southwest Iowa. After graduating from Iowa, he was awarded a Marshall Scholarship to complete an MA in government at the University of Manchester, United Kingdom. He then went on to complete a PhD in international relations at the London School of Economics and a JD from Yale Law School. After passing the California Bar, he joined a large law firm in San Francisco, but soon went international, practicing law for many years in Jeddah and Riyadh, Saudi Arabia, as well as in Paris, France, and finally Dubai, United Arab Emirates. Over the years, Tyner has helped UI students start their own global journeys-through mentoring, study abroad scholarships, and assistance with conference attendance and living expenses.

"The Richard J. Tyner Scholarship allowed me to challenge myself during my time abroad in Seville, Spain. As a heritage speaker of Spanish, I wanted to make sure that my experience abroad would continue to push my language abilities. With the help of the Tyner scholarship, I was able to participate in an advanced liberal arts program that allowed me to directly enroll in classes at the Universidad de Sevilla, studying alongside Spanish college students, at their level. I made local friends, learned how to adapt to a completely distinct educational system, and grew immensely in my language skills, from comprehension, to public speaking, to writing."

SACRED THREADS: SPIRITUALITY, HEALTH, AND COLLABORATIVE PARTNERSHIPS FOR HEALTH IN INDIGENOUS COMMUNITIES

The Major Project, Sacred Threads: Spirituality, Health, and Collaborative Partnerships for Health in Indigenous Communities, brought to campus Lorenzo Sanford, the youngest elected chief in the history of the Kalinago people in Dominica for a series of events in late April 2024. As the last community in the Caribbean claiming direct descent from the indigenous Kalinago, this event series discussed spirituality and healing and the preservation and revitalization of the rich cultural heritage of this ancient tribe.

"I proposed this Major Project because it's urgent for us to initiate discussions on how we can collectively preserve our culture, language, and traditional health knowledge for the benefit of our community. I believe Lorenzo's role is significant as he represents the importance of youth and elders working together to preserve this information. As the youngest indigenous chief of his tribe and of the Caribbean, his leadership and motivation to run for chief is truly inspiring."

NUMBER OF FORMAL AGREEMENTS WITH INTERNATIONAL COLLEGES, UNIVERSITIES, AND ORGANIZATIONS

ROMANIA

In summer 2024, students from the **UI College of Public Health** collaborated with counterparts from Armenia, Georgia, Romania, and Moldova in the weeklong SCOPE Summer School at the **University of Babeş-Bolyai (UBB)** in Romania, focused on violence and injury prevention.

The **UI Office of the Vice President for Research** is exploring opportunities with UBB in the areas of political science, administration, and communication sciences, as well as environmental science and engineering.

KOSOVO

The Ul's Cooperative Agreement with the **United States Agency for International Development (USAID)**, Private Sector Partnerships to Strengthen Higher Education, is entering its second year. This five-year, \$3.9 million Activity is organized largely around developing curricula to meet private sector needs in information and communication technology (ICT) and agriculture. To date, the Activity has generated approximately 70 Memoranda of Understanding to promote workforce development in emerging sectors of Kosovo's economy.

While not connected to the UI-USAID Activity, Iowa is assisting in the process of creating an Institute of Pharmacy at the **University of Prishtina** in Kosovo. In summer 2024, Russ Ganim, associate provost and dean of International Programs, and Don Letendre, professor in the UI College of Pharmacy, met with numerous individuals to give advice on how to develop better practices and deliver improved services and outcomes to the people of Kosovo.

SOUTH AFRICA


The UI and the **University of Johannesburg** have been working together for years, and this year's visit focused on public health and business/ entrepreneurship, with opportunities presenting themselves in engineering, African studies, and the arts. The plan is to use internal resources to seed research collaborations leading to larger external funding opportunities in the future.

FRANCE

The **Big Ten Academic Alliance** renewed its five-year agreement with the **Figure Network** to send French engineering students for summer internships at various Big 10 universities. This summer, the BTAA delegation, which included an IP representative, visited partner universities in France. The goal was not simply to represent the BTAA, but to promote lowa as an institution with world class faculty and facilities in these areas.

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Through the generosity of University of Iowa alumni **C. Maxwell (Max) and Elizabeth (Betty) M. Stanley**, the Stanley-University of Iowa Foundation Support Organization (SUIFSO) was created in 1979. Since its inception, SUIFSO has funded projects to promote public understanding and cooperative action on critical international issues across the UI, including the creation of the Stanley Awards for International Research, given annually to outstanding University of Iowa undergraduate and graduate students for the pursuit of research and learning activities outside of the United States.






